Jesus' Preeminent Claim on the Disciple's Life

1. True Disciples Are Pilgrims, Foreigners, Strangers

Hebrews 11:8-10, 13-16

By faith Abraham, when he was called, obeyed by going out to a place which he was to receive for an inheritance; and he left, not knowing where he was going. ⁹ By faith he lived as a stranger in the land of promise, as *in* a foreign *land*, living in tents with Isaac and Jacob, fellow heirs of the same promise; ¹⁰ for he was looking for the city which has foundations, whose architect and builder is God... All these died in faith, without receiving the promises, but having seen and welcomed them from a distance, and having confessed that they were strangers and exiles on the earth. ¹⁴ For those who say such things make it clear that they are seeking a country of their own. ¹⁵ And indeed if they had been thinking of that *country* which they left, they would have had opportunity to return. ¹⁶ But as it is, they desire a better *country*, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore, God is not ashamed to be called their God; for He has prepared a city for them.

Beloved, I urge you as foreigners and strangers to abstain from fleshly lusts, which wage war against the soul.

1 John 2:15-17

Do not love the world nor the things in the world. • Who are "the dead" to bury their own dead?

John McNeill, a well-known Scottish preacher of a past generation, used to tell how he found this saying directly relevant to him. When his father died in Scotland, towards the end of the nineteenth century, he was in the English Midlands, and was advertised to address an evangelistic meeting in a certain city on the very day of his father's funeral. People would have understood had he sent a message to say that he was compelled to cancel his engagement. `But I dared not send it,' he said, `for this same Jesus stood by me, and seemed to say, "Now, look, I have you. You go and preach the gospel to those people. Whether would you rather bury the dead or raise the dead?" And I went to preach.'

1 Kings 19:19-21

Elijah departed from there and found Elisha the son of Shaphat while he was plowing, with twelve yoke *of oxen* in front of him, and he with the twelfth. And Elijah came over to him and threw his cloak on him.²⁰ Then he left the oxen behind and ran after Elijah, and said, "Please let me kiss my father and my mother, then I will follow you." And he said to him, "Go back, for what have I done to you?" ²¹ So he returned from following him, and took the pair of oxen and sacrificed them, and cooked their meat with the implements of the oxen and gave *it* to the people and they ate. Then he got up and followed Elijah and served him.
